Abolition: Addressing the Root Causes of Violence WNPJ Fall Assembly

Sunday, November 13, 1:00 – 4:00 pm

Traditionally Abolition was understood as the refusal to accept slavery. Modern abolitionists are using the term to cover a spectrum of inhumanities. Abolitionists today may call for the end of policing, as we know it. They may ask us to reevaluate how we spend our money and direct more towards community building rather than punishment. They may ask us to recognize the obligation we have to ensure all children receive an education where they are respected and treated with dignity. They are asking us to reevaluate our relationship to violence. And we are being asked to reckon with our society's unwillingness to change our thinking or to change our systems that continue to foster violence.

Today people are asking us to look deeper into what are the root causes of violence in our communities, in our families, and in our world. We are being asked to heal. This is Abolition.

Abolition is a personal choice that one makes on a daily basis.



The Board of WNPJ chose Abolition to be the focus of the year. We recognize that many of our member groups are engaged in some form of Abolitionist work and we want to support those efforts and foster more.
